Presentation of the Conference

This international meeting will give room for discussions, exchanges, experience sharing and the exploration of possible initiatives to halt the degradation of ecosystems in Africa and to put forward points to consider for their preservation and restoration.

The presentations of the high-level panelists, from different backgrounds, will make it possible to go over real experiences carried out in different regions of Africa and elsewhere.

Since environmental issues are interrelated, going into ecosystems means dealing with specific topics such as ecosystem services, the links between climate change and migration, land restoration and water stress.

The participants and speakers will take the high-level discussion panel to exchange on the state of ecosystems in Africa, before debating on the aforementioned topics during the 4 thematic panels.

The post-conference recommendations shall open prospects for pooling efforts, creating synergies, consolidating partnerships and thinking of innovative actions and initiatives.

The composition of the panels

- The Chairperson: will have to deliver a keynote speech and bring context to the panel.
- **The Moderator**: will make sure to properly lead the talks, maintain balance and equitable sharing between the different speeches, and the respect of the given time.
- The Rapporteur: will take note of the main recommendations, have them summarized and read. He/She will be supported by the OSS team of rapporteurs.
- **The Panelists**: will first have to make presentations on the topics they choose and, then, answer questions from the moderators and the audience.

Foreword:

Climate change is exacerbating the challenges related to food insecurity, economic fragility and environmental degradation, many territories then become unlivable or risky and people have no other choice but to move. Planning ahead is a crucial step to limit the harmful effects of climate change and to stabilize populations by preserving the ecosystems in which they live and by protecting them from the destructive impacts.

Questions to ask:

- 1. Countries can expect to see climate-driven emigration and immigration hotspots. What would be the implications for future development planning?
- 2. Is it possible to halt climate-driven migration movements? What would be the tools to better control these movements?
- 3. Any ideas on how to stop Internal climate-driven migration from being a crisis situation?
- 4. Can migration be a climate change adaptation strategy? How?
- 5. Which of the local, national or regional approaches would be the most effective to manage migration movements ?
- 6. Are the current financial mechanisms strong enough and well adapted to the needs of countries to deal with the migration impacts?
- 7. What are the teachings from climate change adaptation projects focusing on food security?
- 8. Speaking of climate migration, what is the CC contribution in the migration phenomenon as regards the level of economic development of our countries (agriculture, infrastructure, ...)?
- 9. Despite the alarming IPCC forecasts, we must think of how to keep Africa a livable land of hospitality?

Foreword:

According to the United Nations, « Healthy ecosystems are the only way we can improve the living conditions of the populations, combat climate change and halt the loss of biodiversity ». Land, primary and indispensable pillar for human life and a core element of this ambition, undergoes pressure from all sides. Overexploitation, degradation and unsustainable practices leading to considerable losses, changes in natural habitats and ecosystems, and a drastic reduction in ecological services. With 70% of the natural resources and 70% of employment in rural areas (IPBES, 2018), the international community agrees more than ever on the pressing need of its preservation and restoration.

The United Nations Decade on Ecosystem Restoration and initiatives such as Desertif'Actions mark the international community commitment for a prompt and effective action.

Questions to ask:

- 1. What are the major opportunities and challenges related to land restoration?
- 2. How to translate land restoration international commitments into real actions? What would be the key elements of success for these actions?
- 3. How can 100 million hectares of land be restored by 2030 ? What can be the solutions to achieve such an objective and what can be the contribution of initiatives like the Great Green Wall ?
- 4. How can we promote and upgrade technical and traditional knowledge of land management and preservation?
- 5. How do we mobilize the necessary financial resources ? By the way, how much is restoration ?
- 6. To what extent can agroecology provide relevant solutions? Are they reproducible in other countries?

Foreword:

A large portion of the African continent is particularly affected by water scarcity. Water stress has increased significantly due to the impacts of climate change. A well-thought governance of the water resources, working on the information and awareness-raising and the use of unconventional water, such as the reuse of treated wastewater or the desalination of seawater would represent alternatives for a sustainable drinking water supply.

Questions to ask:

- 1. What are the impacts of climate change on water resources in the Northern part of Africa and its limited water availability, and in other regions and their water availability but limited access? What predictions for the future?
- 2. Can appropriate practices and more rational exploitation of water resources put a halt to desertification and land degradation ?
- 3. What role can scientific bodies have in terms of knowledge management and sharing with decision-makers at country level ?
- 4. How do we encourage countries sharing the same aquifer systems to develop their transboundary management framework to meet the challenges and reduce water stress?
- 5. To what extent can the use of unconventional water be a medium-term solution?
- 6. What are the expertise and information exchange mechanisms that can be promoted between African countries?
